PHYSICAL ASPECTS

The old Simla District covered an area of 81 to square miles and comprised Kot Khai Tahsil which included *ilaqa* Kotgarh (49.2 square miles); *ilaqa* Bharauli, which included Sabathu, Dagshai Cantonment, four villages called Bojh Shiva and two villages called Bojh Kalha (24.7 square miles); the Simla town (5.2 square miles); 22 estates (2.5 square miles) mentioned below and the leased area of Solan Cantonment.

The present-day Simla District under the Punjab Government consists of old Simla District minus Kot Khai Tahsil and leased area of Solan Cantonment, which have been transferred to Himachal Pradesh Government, and ilaqa Bharauli, which has been transferred to PEPSU Government plus the following 7 estates (.8 square mile) which have been transferred from Himachal Pradesh Government under the Provinces and States (Absorption of Enclaves) Order, 1950:—

- 1. Bharari.
- 2. Sanjauli.
- 3. Kasumpti (Koti).

- 4. Kasumpti (Keonthal).
- 5. Patti Rehana.
- 6. Chakkar
- 7. Chhota Simla (leased area)

The present Simla District, therefore, has been reduced to an area of 8.5 square miles and except for the detached portion of Jutogh Cantonment is now a compact area.

The Simla District takes its name after its headquarters town, Simla, which "is situated on several small spurs of the lower Himalayas, at a mean elevation of about 7,100 feet above sea level. Its latitude is 31 'o' N. longitude 77° 13 'E. Its distance by the Cart Road (Gurdwara Road) from Kalka Railway Station at the hills is 58 miles. In shape it has been described as an irregular crescent. The various suburbs are called by distinguishing names, such as Barra Simla, Chhota Simla, Prospect Hill, Elysium, Boileauganj (Tilak Nagar), Summer Hill, Kaithu and Jakho." (Simla Past and Present by Edward J. Buck.)

Scenery.

"The scenery round Simla Hill is very fine. The valleys on either side are deep, almost precipitous, and thickly clothed with forests. To the south, the Kasauli and Sabathu Hills appear in the immediate foreground and behind them the plains stretch out to the horizon, the Sutlej being distinctly visible on a clear day from the point where it sweeps round to the west at Rupar till it melts into the horizon. To the south-east lies the Chail peak dotted with the white houses of the Patiala summer headquarters. To the north and east, a network of mountain chains, range rising over range, is crowned in the distance by a magnificient cresent of snowy peaks the mountains of Kulu and Spiti on the north, and the central range of eastern Himalaya stretching east and south-east as far as the eye can reach. The nearest of these peaks, that of Cheru, on the confines of Kulu and Mandi, over 16,000 feet in height, is 27 miles in a straight line from Simla, while the nearest of the central Himalayan peaks is double that distance. Nearer, the sharp booth of the Shali peak is a striking object, while just across the valley are the hills of Mashobra and Mahasu." (Reproduced from Simla District Gazetteer—1904).

FORESTS.

The whole of the district except what is occupied by buildings, roads, private estates, village lands, etc., is covered by forests. These are carefully managed by the Simla Municipality with two objects in view, first to preserve the beauty of the place by the maintenance of ornamental high forest, while at the same time, and as far as is compatible with that object, the forest must be made to yield as large a supply as possible for timber for municipal works and fuel for the general market. The trees generally found here are Deodar, Cupresses Arizoniea, Acacia Dealbata, Villew (Salix) cuttings, Alianthus, Robinia, Walnut.

GEOLOGY.

"The records of the geological branch of the Government of India contain an interesting sketch of the geology of Simla and Jutogh by Mr R. D. Oldham, an officer of the Survey Department, who made a special study of the neighbourhood in 1887. It is interesting to know that his geological researches led him to write "Taking everything into consideration we may, therefore, decide that when the Blaini group was being deposited, the spot now occupied by Simla was a sea on whose surface icebergs floated melted and dropped the stones which they carried on their surface, or imbedded in their substance." The economic geology of Simla is described as "very limited." Prospect Hill is apparently a geological puzzle and the surface geology of Simla is said to be "of considerable difficulty". (Simla Past and Present by Edward J. Buck).

The following geological description is reproduced from page 5 of the Simla District Gazetteer—1904:—

- "The rocks found in the neighbourhood of Simla belong entirely to the carbonaceous system and fall into four groups, the Krol, the infra-Krol, the Blaini, and the infra-Blaini or Simla slates."
- "The Simla slates are the lowest beds seen and are found to the north-east beyond Elysium spur and Sanjauli bazar, they are succeeded by the Blaini group, consisting of two bands of boulder-slate, separated by white-weathering slate ("bleach slates"), and overlain by a thin band of pink dolomitic limestone. The group can be traced from a short distance below Chadwick Falls to below Annandale and the Elysium spur, thence along and below the Mall, past Snowdon

and the Mayo Institute to Sanjauli, the outcrop then turns to the south, running below the Ladies' Mile and the Convent down into the valley east of Chhota Simla. Outliers of the boulder-slate are also seen on the ridge above the tunnel on the Simla-Mahasu The Blaini group is overlain by a band of black carbonaceous slate, which follows the outcrop of the Blaini beds and is particularly noticeable near the corner of the Mall above the Ladies' Mile. inlier also runs for some distance down the valley below Combermere bridge. The overlying beds consist of a great mass of quartzite and schist, known as the Boileauganj beds, they cover the greater part of Simla and extend beyond Prospect Hill to Jutogh. Above these is the Korl group, consisting of carbonaceous slates and carbonaceous and crystaline limestones, with beds of hornblendegarnet schist which probably represent old volcanic ash beds, they are largely developed in Prospect Hill and Jutogh. Intrusive diorite is found among the lower limestones of the Krol group on the southern slopes of Jutogh. No fossils have been found in any of these rocks, and in consequence their geological age is unknown."

ARCHAEOLOGY.

There is nothing of archaeological interest in this district, except the Jakhu temple.

CLIMATE.

€ ã € "

The climate of Simla may be divided into four seasons of about three months each. The first quarter beginning with January—rough, snowy, stormy and raw. The second dry and sunney, with gradually increasing dust and heat. The third raining, damp, and relaxing. The fourth bright, clear and bracing. In no country perhaps are the seasons such seasons of rapidly changing extremes.

RAINFALL.

The average rainfall in the district for the last 25 years is 52 82 inches. The maximum rainfall occurs in the months of July and August.

HISTORY.

"According to a Rev Mr Long, whom Mr W. H. Carey mentioned in Simla Guide of 1870, Simla derives its name from "Shyeamalay", the house built of blue slate erected by a Fakir on Jakko, the first nucleus of the settlement. But this derivation, be it noted, is regarded by many people as fanciful and farfetched, and probably "Shimlah" or "Shumlah" as pronounced by the hill people, is the actual word from which the station takes its present name."

"The original village of Simla was situated on the ground lying to the east of the present Secretariat buildings above the road leading to the Ripon Hospital, and immediately below the Roman Catholic chapel, S. Michael's school and the court house. A detached portion inhabited entirely by charcoal burners lay just over the spur till further east, immediately below the spot where the Mohammadan mosque now stands. At the beginning of the last century, Simla was described as an obscure village taken from the

Jhind Rana in 1815, and given to the Patiala Raja for assistance rendered to the British in the Nepal war, subsequently resigned by the Raja for a sanitarium " (Simla Past and Present by Edward J. Buck, page 4).

The official history of the Simla "ilaqa" or district up to 1850 has been given in the Settlement Report on the Simla District by Colonel E. G. Wace, from which the following description is taken:—

The lands forming the pargana and the present station of Simla originally belonged conjointly to the Maharaja of Patiala and the Rana of Keonthal. As early as 1824 European gentlemen, chiefly invalids from the plains, had, with the permission of these chiefs established themselves in this locality, building houses on sites granted them rent-free and with no other stipulation than that they should refrain from the slaughter of kine, and from the felling of trees, unless with previous permission of the proprietors of the land. Gradually the place become favourably known as a sanitarium, and in 1830 the Government directed that negotiations should be entered into with the chiefs of Patiala and Keonthal for the acquisition of land sufficient to form a station. Accordingly Major Kennedy, the Political Agent, negotiated an exchange with the Rana of Keonthal for his portion of the Simla hill, comprising 12 villages, making over to the Rana the pargana of Rawin. tion of the retained pargana of Bharauli, consisting of three small villages, was at the same time made over to the Maharaja of Patiala in exchange for his portion of Simla included in his territory.

In 1822 Lt Kennedy, then Assistant Political Agent in the Hill States, built the first permanent house in Simla. His example was quickly followed by officers from Ambala and neighbouring stations and by 1826 the new Settlement had acquired a name, so much so, that in 1827 Lord Amherst, then Governor-General, after completing the progress, through the north-west, with which he celebrated the triumphant ending of the Bhartpur campaign, proceeded for the summer months to Simla. This was the foundation of Simla's greatness.

In the following year Lord Combermere with his staff and the whole establishment of Army Headquarters came up to Simla. Lord William Bentick came up for the first time in 1832, and in that vear received a mission from Ranjit Singh, by which the meeting at Rupar was arranged, and in the same year Lord Dalhousie, who had succeeded Lord Combermere as Commander-in-Chief, came up to Simla. From this time the Commanders-in-Chief appear to have

come up to Simla fairly regularly, and their example was soon followed by the Governor-General. At first only a small staff of clerks accompanied the Governor-General, but in 1864 Lord Lawerence came, accompanied by the Supreme Council and all the public offices, since when Simla became the Summer Capital of the Government of India, till the World War-II.

The Punjab Government first went to Simla in 1871. It again went in 1872. In 1873, 1874 and 1875 the Lientenant-Governor went to Murree. In 1876 the Punjab Government returned to Simla which remained the Summer headquarters of this Government too till World War II.

In August 1947, when India achieved independence and the Punjab was partitioned, the displaced Government of East Punjab and its establishment found refuge in the spacious buildings of Simla.

POPULATION.

The population of the present diminutive or remarkably small Simla District (8.5 square miles) as censused in 1951 is 46,150, whereas the population of the old Simla District (81.6 square miles) in 1941 was 38,576. The density per square mile of the district is 5,429.4.

Population of the district has tremendously increased since August 15, 1947, when the displaced East Punjab Government and its establishment migrated to Simla. Simla being a hill station, its population figure rises to about a lac in the summer season.

ADMINISTRATION.

The Simla District is administered by an Administrator since the transfer of enclaves. He is assisted by a Magistrate Class I-cum-Revenue Assistant, a Treasury Officer and a Naib-Tahsildar.

MEDICAL AND PUBLIC HEALTH.

Sickness prevails chiefly in the weeks immediately preceding the advent of the monsoon when the air is full of foul dust and the heat most trying, and again the steamy days between successive rainfalls, favourable no doubt for the generation of the all-pervading 'germ'. At these times prevails the illness known as the 'Simla-ep-' a troublesome epidemic of mild choleraic character, but sometimes fatal to the weakly. With this exception, however, and that of indigestion with which delicate constitutions are troubled, Simla is fairly healthy, although from May to September the climate is not of what is termed a 'recuperative' character. (Reproduced from Simla Past and Present by Edward J. Buck).

The Municipality of Simla is a strict and vigilant guardian of public health. The Punjab Government has placed the services of a Health Officer at the disposal of the Municipal Committee. The

Municipality has 10 Sanitary Inspectors, which include one Food and one Disinfection Inspectors. They are authorised to take samples of all sorts of food, milk and other eatables sold in the The Municipality has its own Food Laboratories where the samples are analysed and prosecutions are launched on the basis of the analytic report of the Food Analyst. A safai staff consisting of 375 members and 19 Sanitary Orderlies is engaged to clean the roads, streets, lanes and drains daily. The disposal of night soil is done by inlaid water-borne system. A closed system of Cast Iron Sewers of 4", 5" and 6" - 9" sizes is laid all over Simla. The entire drainage system of the town which consists of Pail Depots, Sewers and Septic Tanks, etc., is efficiently maintained by the Municipality. The repairs of drains, etc., and of evacuee property, especially the down-pipes in them, is done by the Engineering Roads and Buildings Branch of the Municipality. Primary vaccination is compulsory and done free of charge at four affixed stations, namely Chota Simla, Ripon Hospital, Municipal Committee's office and Boileauganj (Tilak Nagar). There are two vaccinators engaged for this purpose. Inoculations for Cholera, Plague and Typhoid are done free of charge. There is an Isolation Hospital where infectious cases, especially that of Cholera, Smallpox and Dyptheria, are isolated. The water supplied in the town is pure and of first class quality.

Simla has some of the best hospitals (Ripon Hospital, Walker Hospital, Lady Reading Women and Children Hospital) in the country, under the superintendence of the Civil Surgeon, Simla. These hospitals have well qualified staff and are equipped on modern lines throughout. Besides, there are a number of dispensaries under the management of the Simla Municipality. The Himachal Pradesh Government has recently started a hospital in Snowdon, which used to be the residence of the Commander-in-Chief before.

EDUCATION AND LITERACY.

According to the 1951 Census 31,697 persons out of a total population of 46,150 have returned themselves as literates. This high literacy percentage (68.7 per cent) is probably due to the population who have migrated to Simla. Education in hills is still in a backward state, very few of the hillmen can read or write.

There are 4 Colleges, 4 High, 4 Middle, and 8 Primary Indian Schools for boys, 4 High, 3 Middle, 1 Lower Middle, and 7 Primary Indian Schools for girls, 5 Anglo-Indian Schools and 1 Industrial School for girls in this district.

There are four up-to-date big libraries, namely, the State Library, Municipal Library, the Punjab University Library and

Dwarka Das Library.

AGRICULTURE AND CO-OPERATION.

The population of the Simla Hills, out of Simla Town, is almost entirely agricultural though many doubtless supplement their income by taking service in Simla during the season. The great majority of the rural population are peasant-proprietors cultivating their own lands.

The soil of the district being stony, the cultivation is done in very small fields built up against the hill-sides. Total area under cultivation in the district is 303 acres. The land is almost entirely dependent on rainfall.

The principal Rabi crops are wheat and barley with *masur* as a subsidiary foodgrain, *sarshaf* or *sarson* (mustard seed) as an oilseed, spices, viz. *lahsun* (*garlic*), onions and *dhania* and vegetables, viz. *muli* (radish).

In the Kharif, makki, rice and koda are the staples, with $mash\ (urd)$ and kulthi as subsidiary foodgrains. Til is the oil-seed and chillies, haldi (turmeric) and adrak are grown as spices. Fruit is also grown extensively and vegetables including potatoes. The revenue paying crops are ginger and rice, but sometimes makki and wheat are also sold. All the remaining crops are, as a rule, grown for local consumption by the people themselves (Reproduced from Simla District Gazetteer-1904)

There are 24 Primary Co-operative Societies in this district. Industries.

There are 2 registered flour-mills, 2 oil pressing mills and 4 trunk makers in Simla.

Weaving and toy-making are the cottage industries of this place.

The Industries Department, Punjab, maintains a Cottage Industries Museum and Emporium at Simla. This institution is doing extremely useful work in providing marketing facilities as well as publicity and propaganda for the cottage industries in the State.

LOCAL BODIES AND PANCHAYATS.

Jutogh Cantonment is served by a Cantonment Board, while the remaining district now forms the present area of the Simla Municipal Committee.

REHABILITATION OF DISPLACED PERSONS.

Total number of displaced persons who are settled in this district is 14,281. Simla was declared a non-refugee station by the Punjab Government, and, therefore, no rehabilitation work was conducted in the villages, nor the evacuee lands are so productive that any displaced person might have liked to settle there. However, 133 evacuee shops have been allotted to the displaced persons.

PLACES OF INTEREST.

There are a number of places of interest in and around Simla, where people enjoy their leisure time or often go out for their weekends and picnics. There is so much to see and enjoy in these hills that a visitor to Simla can easily spend a few months without having a single dull or uninteresting moment.

Lajpat Rai Chowk. This is the place on the Lajpat Rai Road where the people gather together in the evenings. There is a statute of Punjab Kesri Lala Lajpat Rai, which was brought from Lahore after the Independence of the country and installed at this central point of Simla. The public of Simla pay homage to their beloved leader by placing wreaths at his feet on the 17th November every year—the death anniversary day of Lala Ji. Close by are the Simla Municipal Public Reading Room, the Municipal Offices, and Head Post Office.

The Ridge. On the right of the Head Post Office is the Ridge. Under it is the reservoir which contains the town's drinking water. A hoarding of Mahatma Gandhi is fixed near the Simla Municipal Library. Close by there is a plateau which has a few benches for the public to sit and enjoy the view of Simla. The flag hoistening ceremony on the Independence Day is celebrated at this place.

Children and Ladies Park. Near the Ridge is a park for children and ladies.

Men's Park. A little further from the Children and Ladies Park is the Men's Park.

Jakku Mandir. On the summit of the Jakku hill is a temple known as Jakku temple. A pretty view of the entire Simla can be had from this place.

Kali Bari. Near the Central Telegraph Office is the temple of Kali.

President's Lodge. On the way from Simla to Summer Hill on the Observatory Hill is situated the President's Lodge known as "the dream in stone"

Prospect Hill. At a distance of about 40 minutes' walk from the Lajpat Rai Chowk is the conical hill to the west known as Prospect Hill. A bird's eye view of Simla can be had from this hill.

Annandale. A road wending down from Race View goes to the great valley of Simla known as Annandale. Here are held the Dussehra fair, races and sports tournaments, etc.

Glen. On the right of the President's Lodge the road leads to a lonely, cool, green place known as Glen.

Summer Hill. The long woody range on the right of the President's Lodge is known as Summer Hill.

Chadwick Falls. A long and tedious way along the Summer Hill road leads to Chadwick Falls.

Besides the above Tara Devi Temple at a distance of about 6 miles from Simla, Mashobra at a distance of about 8 miles from Simla on the Simla-Durgapur Road, Suni in the Kasumpti area, Kufri about 8 miles from Simla on the way to Narkanda, Chaba Electric Works at a distance of about 20 miles from Simla and Kotgarh at a distance of about 50 miles from Simla on the Hindustan-Tibet Road are some of the places around Simla which are worth visiting.
