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Means of Livelihood and Industries Tables Punjab—1941 Census On Y-Sample

FOREWORD

OWING to war the tabulation of 1941 Census was greatly curtailed. But Shri Yeatts, the Census Commissioner for India, shrewdly decided to retain a 2% random sample of the original individual census slips of each state. On the recommendations of the Population Data Committee (of which Shri Yeatts was the Chairman and Prof. P.C. Mahalanobis, Prof. K.B. Madhava, Dr. Theodore Gregory, and Dr. K.C.K.E. Raja, Members) the Government of India decided to entrust the Y—Sample slips in 1945 to the Indian Statistical Institute, Calcutta, where the information in the slips was transferred to Hollerith cards. From these cards two series of Tables have been prepared by the Institute, (a) Age Tables and (b) Means of Livelihood and Industries Tables for the states for which no such Tables had been prepared at the time of the 1941 Census. The Age-Tables were published in 1948-51 while the publication of the Livelihood and Industries Tables has been taken up only now. The Institute have also in hand certain sampling studies on the Bihar slips.

INTRODUCTION

The census tabulation of 1941 was curtailed as a measure of retrenchment owing to the exigencies of the war by the elimination of a number of useful tables. Fortunately, however, the Y-Sample of the original war by the community of the individual slips obtained by drawing out every fiftieth slip after sex classification was preserved and the individual stips obtained by drawing out every interest stip after sex classification was preserved and the information in these sample slips was subsequently transferred to Hollerith cards. Age tables based on this sample have already been prepared for the state of Punjab and now tables on 'Means of Livelihood and Industries' based on the same sample are given here.

The Means of Livelihood' tables have been prepared for the whole State and also for its constituent districts. In the State table, the number of independent or self-supporting persons having their principal means of livelihood in different occupational groups (classified according to the class of subsidiary means of livelihood, if any) are shown. The number of partly dependents following any specified occupation as their 'Supporting Means of Livelihood' is also given. In the district tables, however, such information is given only by broader occupational groups.

The table on Industrial classification of persons is prepared only for the State as a whole. This shows the number of workers (employees) engaged in the different Industries (groups) classified according to the class of workers.


Owing largely to conditions created by the war, the Y-Sample could not be properly stored after extraction, and as a consequence, the available sample was slightly defective. Adjustments have been made to eliminate, as far as possible, the effect of such defects on the basis of the information already published in the Census Report.
