The illustration on the right hand bottom of the cover page represents a Kulvi (native of Kulu) who is shown playing Narsinga. Narsinga is one of the most common musical instruments used in the hills of Himachal Pradesh. It is typical symbol particularly of Kulvis displaying their joy in playing Narsinga.

In Kulu, which is known as valley of gods, Narsinga playing is attributed to invoking local deities and gods. This musical instrument is played everywhere in the district on auspicious occasions besides in temples and fairs. In temples Narsinga playing is a must to propitiate gods both in the morning and evening service. Religious functions such as marriages and other auspicious ceremonies are invariably solemnised with great enthusiasm and playing of Narsinga besides other musical instruments.

PREFACE

Introduction of the District Census Handbooks in the Census publication programme, in 1951 Census, was a big landmark in the history of Indian Census. Since then these Handbooks are being regularly brought out by the Census Organisation on behalf of the State Government. District Census Handbooks contain important and basic statistics relating to the districts in the State. The most important part of the Handbooks relates to the villagewise and urban blockwise Primary Census data — data at the micro level — which is utilized in almost every field of planning—educational, developmental, manpower etc. This data is also used for other important purposes such as adjustment of administrative boundaries, delimitation of electoral constituencies etc. Immediately on the completion of Census the administrative authorities, private agencies and academic institutions, in fact most data users, are anxious to have the latest figures made available to them so that they are able to assess and pursue their activities in a more purposeful manner.

In order to make the necessary data available early to the Census data users, a major change has been made in publication programme of the District Census Handbooks of 1971 Census. Instead of incorporating all the information and statistics of a particular District in a single Volume, the same has been divided into three parts—'A', 'B' and 'C'—so that parts 'A' and 'B', containing (i) Village Directory and Town Directory and (ii) Villagewise and Townwise Primary Census Abstracts, could be released early without waiting for the compilation of data to be included in part 'C'. Originally the programme was to bring out all the parts 'A', 'B' and 'C' independently, as soon as compilations for a particular part were completed. Since the data for parts 'A' and 'B' were compiled simultane-

ously, it was decided to combine these parts in one volume which, I feel, will be more convenient to data users to consult as the volume contains primary statistics relating to the district at one place. The present volume consists of the Parts 'A' and 'B' of the District Census Handbook of Kulu. It is proposed to bring out Part 'C' of this publication as also for other Districts, independently, later, because at present the administrative information has just started pouring in from the various Government Departments and Organisations. It will take some more time to put together these facts and figures into proper shape, for the part 'C' volume.

As a result of re-organisation of the State of Punjab in 1966, 4 Districts namely Kangra, Kulu, Simla and Lahul and Spiti were carved out from Punjab and included in the State of Himachal Pradesh raising the number of districts to ten. Kulu is one of the four new districts in the present Census. Prior to 30th July, 1963, it was a Sub-Division of the Kangra District and it was the then Punjab Government which upgraded this Sub-Division to the status of a District. The Jurisdictions of this district remained the same as of the erstwhile Sub-Division of that name. This District now comprises one tehsil and three sub-tehsils.

The District lies in the mid-Himalayan ranges and is bounded by Lahul and Spiti District in the North, Kangra and Mandi Districts in the West, Mahasu District in the West, South and South East and Kinnaur District in the East. River Beas enters the district in the North-West of Rahala and meanders its way through the picturesque Kulu Valley which is about 80 Kms. long and 1.6 Kms. wide. River Sutlej bounds the district in the South flowing from East to West.

Kulu Valley has always been a centre of attraction to tourists and finds its place amongst the important tourist centres of the country. Tourists from different corners of the country make a beeline for the valley to escape from scorching heat of the plains. Known as the valley of Gods, it captivates the hearts of the visitors through the scenic beauty of its lush forests of deodar and pine, gushing streams and velvety meadows. The pyramids of orchards with bejewelled and effulgent snow-clad peaks acting as a back-drop, present a gorgeous view. Some of the tourists visiting Kulu Valley will

certainly like to know something about the people and various places in this district and if they could lay hands on this volume, I am sure, it would serve their purpose to a certain extent.

I owe my thanks to Shri A. Chandra Sekhar, Registrar General and Census Commissioner India, from whom I have received guidance and considerations, most consistently. Dr. B. K. Roy Burman, Deputy Registrar General was always helpful in solving my numerous problems and I feel highly indebted to him.

EXPLANATORY NOTE—PART A

1. History of the District Census Handbook

The District Census Handbook was an innovation of the 1951 Census. Prior to 1951 Census, the Census Reports and Publications threw up the data upto Tehsil/Sub-Tehsil, Town and District levels. Statistics for smaller territorial units than these were not published in any census publication. With the rapid development and socio-economic changes in the society, necessity of data for administrative unit at the lowest level was felt, considerably by the Government and other organisations as well as the agencies using census statistics. With a view to removing this shortcoming, selected census statistics upto village level were incorporated in the District Census Handbooks of 1951 Census.

Then it shall be seen that the 1951 Census Handbooks contained all the important Census Tables, in respect of a particular district as well as general information relating to Physical Aspects, Geology, Archaeology, Climate, Rainfall, History, Administration, Medical and Public Health, Education and Literacy, Agriculture and Co-operation, Industries, Local Bodies, Places of interest etc. relating to the district.

The District Census Handbooks for 1961 Census underwent complete transformation and attempts were made to make them more informative. Information on all the aspects, covered in 1951 Census and on additional items also found place in 1961 District Census Handbooks. Each District Census Handbook in 1961 Census was divided into four parts, each part containing specific set of information and statistics, as briefly-discussed below:-

Part—I. Besides containing a narrative pertaining to introduction of the particular district, this part comprised mainly of write-up supported by

small tables on topics like Physical Aspects, Population, the People, District Administration, Education, Medical and Public Health, Agriculture, Fisheries, Animal Husbandary, Panchyats, Local Bodies, Co-operative Societies, Banking, Industries, Employment Service, Communications and Road Development, Land Revenue and Land Tenure, Price Trends and Community Development, Flora and Fauna etc. In some Handbooks certain reprints of extracts from works of important authorities were also included.

Part—II All the Census Tables pertaining to a district were included in this part.

Part—III This part of the District Census Handbooks contained the Administrative Statistics on Agriculture, Administration, Medical and Public Health, Local bodies, Transport and Communications, Livestock, Forests and other Departments.

Part—IV This part mainly consisted of the Village Directory, which rendered an account of each village and town in the district. The Census information in this part was given under 36 suitable heads. In addition to the census statistics in respect of each village and town, information about the level of development and amenities was also collected and incorporated in this part. Amenities like Schools, Places of Worship, Medical Institutions, Roads, Railways, Telegraph and Post Offices, Electricity etc., if available in a particular village/town were indicated

with the help of specific abbreviations.

2. Scope of the District Census Handbooks

It has been the experience of this organization that due to various factors, most of which were beyond its control, the publication of some of the 1961 District Census Handbooks was inordinately delayed, which resulted in unnecessary hardship to the data users. The utility of statistics lies in their timely publication. Statistical data published late lose much of their relevance. With this in view, for the 1971 Census, priorities have been fixed for the publication of the different sets of information. It would be our utmost endeavour to publish the information as soon as the relevant tables and other material are ready. This, it is hoped, would result in the reduction of time-lag that usually occurs in making the information available to the Government and other data users.

The District Census Handbooks pertaining to 1971 Census are being brought out in two independent parts as follows:-

(i) (a) *Part A: Town Directory and Village Directory* : Data relating to important characteristics alongwith other information for each town in a district have been compiled in the form of seven statements. It is for the first time that this type of information has been compiled and published in census publications, in the shape of Town Directory. The first six statements contain Townwise statistics and information on a variety of subjects like Status, Growth History and Functional Category of Towns; Physical Aspects and Location of Town, 1969; Municipal Finance, 1968—69; Civic and other Amenities, 1969; Medical, Educational, Recreational and Cultural Facilities in Towns, 1969; and Trade, Commerce, Industry and Banking, 1969. The seventh statement contains Census data on religion in respect of each town.

The Village Directory gives for each village particulars of amenities available in the matter of Educational and Medical Institutions, Power

Supply, Drinking Water Supply, Post and Telegraph Facilities, Communications, Particulars of Land Use, Weekly Markets, Places of Religious, Historical or Archaeological interest in the village.

(b) *Part B : Villagewise and Townwise Primary Census Abstract* : This part contains the primary census data for each village. The primary data pertains to Area, Occupied Residential Houses, Number of Households, Total Population and its Sex-wise break-up, Sex-wise Scheduled Caste and Scheduled Tribe Population, Sex-wise Literate Population, Working Population by Sex and by nine broad Categories i. e. Cultivators; Agricultural Labourers; those working in Livestock, Forestry, Fishing, Hunting, Plantations, Orchards and Allied Activities; Mining and Quarrying; In Manufacturing, Processing, Servicing and Repairs, In Construction; In Trade and Commerce; In Transport Storage and Communications, and In Other Services; and the Non-working Population also with Sex-wise breakup. Similar information is incorporated in this part, in respect of each Town/Urban Area and the Wards/Enumerator's Blocks, therein.

(ii) *Part C : Administrative Statistics and Report* : The administrative statistics in all fields of development pertaining to the district will be the main content of this part. Other Census Tables relating to the district i.e. General Population Tables, Economic Tables, Social and Cultural Tables, Migration Tables, Establishment Tables, Fertility Tables and Housing Tables, will also be included in this part.

3. Collection of Non-Census data

The information in respect of Town Directory has been collected from various departments concerned and the respective Urban Local Bodies. Apart from the Urban Local Bodies, without whose co-operation the compilation of such an exhaustive Town Directory would not have been possible at all, mention must be made of some of the important departments of the

Government of Himachal Pradesh which furnished the statistics and information falling in their respective spheres. These are : The Secretary (L. S. G.) to the Government of Himachal Pradesh; The Director of Industries, Himachal Pradesh; The Director of Health Services, Himachal Pradesh; The Director of Education, Himachal Pradesh; The Chief Engineers, Himachal Pradesh P.W.D.; and the Registrar Co-operative Societies, Himachal Pradesh. And lastly personal observation and local enquiries by the Investigators of this office yielded many a piece of information and relevant data.

The information for the compilation of Village Directory was collected with the assistance of the Revenue Department of the Government of Himachal Pradesh. The Patwaris were drafted as enumerators and the Kanungos were deputed to supervise this work, under the over all control of the Tehsildar/Naib-Tehsildar concerned. The data was collected by Patwaris in a Schedule, especially devised for the purpose, strictly in accordance with a set of instructions issued in this behalf. However, later the officials of the Directorate of Census Operations, Himachal Pradesh, were sent out in the field, again, with a view to rectifying the shortcomings and reconciling the discrepancies. Thus the information, by and large, pertains to mid, 1970. The area figures were based on the 'Lal Kitab' or the Revenue Village Papers as maintained at the Tehsil/Sub-Tehsil level and the latest available figures were taken into account.

4. The Town Directory—Brief description and analysis

A comprehensive Town Directory running in the form of seven statements highlighting all important physical, economic, civic and developmental and certain social aspects, has been compiled in respect of each town in Himachal Pradesh. This Town Directory forms an important part of Part 'A' of the District Census Handbooks.

(a) *Census Definition of Town* : The standards laid down for considering a place as

an urban area were broadly the same as in 1961 Census. However, criteria adopted for determining the urban areas in the 1971 Census were maintained on the following pattern:-

"To qualify for recognition as an urban area a place should first be either a Municipal Corporation area or a Municipal Area or under a Town Committee or a Notified Area Committee or a Cantonment Board. If it did not have any of these urban local bodies to administer the affairs, then the following empirical tests should be applied.

- (i) A minimum population of 5,000 (estimated for 1971).
- (ii) A density of not less than 400 per Sq. Km. (1,000 per Sq. Mile)
- (iii) 3/4th of the occupations of the male working population should be outside agriculture and,
- (iv) The place should have, according to the Director of Census Operations of the State, a few pronounced urban characteristics and amenities."

Thus all the places having an urban local body such as a Municipal Corporation or a Municipal Committee or a Notified Area Committee or a Cantonment Board were obviously treated as towns in this district. No place which did not have a statutory urban local body was treated as an urban area in Kulu District.

(b) *The Seven Statements of Town Directory* : Data in respect of the Town Directory has been compiled and presented in the form of seven statements. In all these statements the information is shown individually for each town, the towns having been arranged in alphabetical order. A broad outline of each statement is given hereunder:-

5. Statement I—Status, Growth History and Functional Category of Towns :

This statement runs into 14 columns and is primarily intended to throw up a comparative picture of the population of each town in the

different censuses from 1901 to 1971. The Civic Administration Status of each town is shown under col. 5. The last column of statement I (Col.14, Functional category-1961 Census) would require some elucidation. It may be relevant to describe the method followed in arriving at the functional character of a particular town according to 1961 Census, in this context. The working population according to 1961 Census was classified into nine broad Industrial Categories viz., I—As Cultivator; II—As Agricultural Labourer; III—In Mining, Quarrying, Livestock, Forestry, Fishing, Hunting & Plantations, Orchards and Allied Activities; IV—At Household Industry; V—In Manufacturing other than Household Industry; VI—In Construction; VII—In Trade & Commerce; VIII—In Transport, Storage & Communications; and IX—In Other Services. For working out the functional category in respect of a particular town these nine categories were suitable combined and grouped into five broad Functional Classifications as below:-

- (i) Primary Activities—Industrial Categories I, II & III
- (ii) Industry—Industrial categories IV, V & VI
- (iii) Trade & Commerce—Industrial Category VII
- (iv) Transport—Industrial Category VIII, and
- (v) Services—Industrial Category IX

The percentage of workers under each of these five classes of economic activities to total workers in a particular town was calculated and the functional character of the town determined according to these percentage values. If workers under one of the five occupations, accounted for 40% or more of the total workers, the town was considered as mono-functional e.g., Service, Industrial etc. However, in case the percentage was less than 40 the next predominant occupation was taken into account, so that the total of the two would come to 60% or above. Such a town was designated as bifunctional e.g., Service-cum-Industrial. Further, if the total did not come upto 60% the third predominant occupation was taken into account and such a

town was designated Multi-functional e.g., Service-cum-Industrial-cum-Primary Activities.

Statement II—Physical Aspects and Location of Towns, 1969 :

Data on annual rain fall, and temperature is shown under columns 3 to 5 of this statement which runs into 13 columns. The other columns indicate the distances of a town from the nearest city with a population of 1 Lakh or more, from the Head-quarters of the State, District, Sub-division, Tehsil/Sub-Tehsil and from the nearest Railway Station, Bus Route, Navigable river/canal (if within 10 Kms.). The last column viz, col. No. 13 pertains to the Sea Port (if within 50 Kms.). Obviously there is no information to be recorded under this column in Himachal Pradesh.

Statement III—Municipal Finance, 1968—69 :

This statement shows the Receipt and Expenditure in respect of the Municipal Finance of individual towns under different heads. There are, in all, 16 columns in this statement.

Statement IV—Civic and Other Amenities, 1969 :

This statement displays information under 16 heads. The amenities, about which information has been incorporated are, Road Length in kms., (with breakup by Kutcha & Pucca if available) System of Sewerage/Drainage and other related matters; Water Supply; Fire Fighting Service; and Electrification.

Statement V—Medical, Educational, Recreational and Cultural Facilities in Towns, 1969 :

This statement is intended to depict the degree of availability of Medical facilities by type of institutions and number of beds available in each; Educational facilities by levels/types of Courses; and Recreational and Cultural Facilities. This statement has 17 columns.

Statement VI—Trade, Commerce, Industry and Banking, 1969 :

This statement displays information under 15 columns in respect of each town. The information pertains to Imports, Exports, Manufactures, Banks, and Agricultural and Non-agri-

cultural Credit Societies.

Statement VII—Population of Towns by religion, 1971 :

Townwise breakup of the 1971 Census population by religion is shown in this statement.

(c) *Coverage:* There are only two towns in Kulu District which are covered in the Town Directory. Of these Sultanpur (Kulu) was an Urban area in the 1961 Census also, but Manali which was declared as a Notified Area during the intercensal period is a new town in the present census. Both these towns are located in Kulu Tehsil.

(d) *Sources of Information :* The Information has been collected from the respective Urban Local Bodies and the concerned departments of the Government of Himachal Pradesh. Temperature and Rain fall data have been partially collected from the Director General of Observatories, Government of India, Poona.

(e) *Brief notes on Statements :*

Statement I—Status, Growth History and Functional Category of Towns :

There are only two towns in Kulu District, both of which are located in Kulu Tehsil. Of these, Sultanpur (Kulu) is administered by a Municipal Committee whereas Manali has a Notified Area Committee. The notations utilized in the Statement alongwith their explanation are given hereunder :

Sultanpur (Kulu) has been urban area since 1951 Census and its population has registered an increase from 3,694 in that year to 8,958 in 1971 Census. Manali Town which is a new town

in the present Census has registered a population of only 1,800 souls.

According to the 1961 Census statistics Kulu Town belongs to Service-Cum-Industrial-Cum-Primary Activities category. Because Manali has been considered as a town for the first time in 1971 Census the functional category could not be worked out in its case. It may be relevant to record here that Manali has acquired great importance as a tourist and health resort in recent years.

Statement II—Physical Aspects and Location of Towns, 1969 :

The Physical and locational aspects of the towns are covered in this statement. Data on temperature and annual rainfall is not available for both the towns in this district.

Statement III—Municipal Fir arce, 1968—69 :

Table No. 2 given hereunder shows per capita Receipt and Expenditure, further classified according to sources and various activities, respectively, in respect of the different population size-classes of towns.

Kulu town falls in the population size-class V (5,000-9,999) whereas Manali falls in the size-class VI (below 5,000). Per capita total receipt in case of class V is Rs. 30.06 P whereas it is Rs. 26.67 P for the class VI. As for per capita expenditure in the two classes, the difference is not quite marked.

The above table reveals that only 4.18 beds are available per 1,000 of urban population of Kulu District. The absolute number of beds available in the medical institutions of Kulu

District is 45. Both the towns have the facility of a hospital, as well as a T. B. Clinic. Certain other types of medical facilities are also available in the two towns.

In matters of educational facilities, both Sultanpur (Kulu) and Manali towns have a Higher Secondary or Secondary School, each. Kulu town is provided with an Arts and Science College also. Moreover 4 different recognized Short-hand, Typewriting and other Vocational Training Institutions, besides a J.B.T. Institution, are located in Sultanpur (Kulu).

Table No. 4 given below shows number of Schools providing educational facilities upto various levels per 1,000 inhabitants in the towns of Kulu District.

The number of both Higher Secondary or Secondary Schools and Primary Schools work out at less than 1 per 1,000 souls i.e. negligible in Sultanpur (Kulu) but the corresponding figures work out at 1 in both cases, for Manali Town. There is no Middle Schools in any of these towns.

No recreational facilities, falling in the perview of this statement are available in Manali. However, Sultanpur (Kulu) has a Stadium, a Cinema, an Open-Air Auditorium and 4 Public Libraries.

Statement VI—Trade, Commerce, Industry and Banking, 1969 :

The noteworthy features of this statement are : (i) Timber, Fruits (Apples) and Potatoes are exported from both these towns. Herbs form yet another item of export in case of Sultanpur (Kulu) town and (ii) Shawls are manufactured in both these towns. In fact 'Kulu Shawls' are a reputed commodity commanding ready market in north India. Kulu Apples are also very popular. Sultanpur (Kulu) has four banks whereas Manali has none.

Statement VII—Population of Town By Religion, 1971 :

Hindus constitute 59.17% of the total population in Manali and 89.15% in Sultanpur (Kulu). The next important community is constituted by Buddhists in both these towns, their percentage being 37.44 in Manali and

6.11 in Sultanpur (Kulu). Other religious groups are insignificant, excepting Sikhs who form 4.21% of the population in Sultanpur (Kulu) and 2.11% in Manali.

5. Village Directory

(i) *Concept of Census Village* : In 1961 Census, a Census Village was the same as a Revenue Village. After reorganisation of Punjab, Haryana and Himachal Pradesh on 1st November, 1966 some areas were transferred from the erst-while state of Punjab to Himachal Pradesh. Whereas in some of these newly merged Districts/Tehsils etc., the revenue village is comparable in population-size and area to the revenue village of the old districts yet in most of the cases the average revenue village is much bigger in area and population than its counterpart in the old districts. The difference is so marked that it renders comparison of the village-wise statistics an exercise in futility. Therefore, smaller rural units were considered as Census Villages in most of the newly merged areas of Himachal Pradesh. Kulu is one such district where although a "Kothi" is a revenue village yet a "Phatti" has been recognised as a Census Village. All these Phatties have distinct Sub-Hadbast numbers i. e. the revenue numbers. It may be relevant to detail here area-wise, the names of the Smallest Census Rural Units considered as Census Villages in Himachal Pradesh. This information is given below :

(a) *Distribution of villages by area*:—The following Table No. 5 shows number of villages in the different area size-classes, in Kulu District:—

Perusal of the above table would reveal

that Kulu is a district of medium-sized villages. The highest number of villages i.e. 86 is in the area size-class 201-500 hectares which is 51% of the total. Villages having area between 101-200 hectares are 44 in number. There is only 1 village in the size-class 50 hectares or less and another 2 in the size-class 1,001-2,000 hectares. No village is claimed by the two highest size-classes of 2,001-5,000 hectares and 5,001 hectares and above.

(b) Availability of Educational Facilities :

Table No. 6 reproduced hereunder, shows the villages classified according to their distances from the nearest town, and the number enjoying the educational facilities upto various levels, in these classes, in Kulu District.

Against 169 villages in this district there are 197 Primary Schools which implies that some of the villages have more than one Primary School. However as for villages, there are 130 villages which have Primary School (s). In the category of villages situated at distances between 26-50 Kms. 23 have 45 Primary Schools amongst them out of a total of 27 villages. There are 37 Middle Schools (one village has two Middle Schools) in the district out of which

12 are claimed by the villages of the interior i.e. those situated at 51-100 Kms. from the nearest town. Such villages are 42 in number. The remaining 25 Schools are distributed rather proportionately throughout the district. But the distribution of the High or Higher Secondary Schools follows a different pattern. Their number in the 27 villages situated at distance of 26-50 Kms. and in the 42 villages situated at distance of 51-100 Kms. from the nearest town

is 1 each. The 44 villages situated at distances between 16-25 Kms. and the 24 villages lying between 11-15 Kms. from the nearest town, claim 4 High or Higher Secondary Schools each. In the later case one village has two High or Higher Secondary Schools. There is 1 'Other' type of institution in a village situated at less than 5 Kms. from the nearest town. This

institution, in fact, is the Mountaineering Institute.

(c) *Availability of Medical Facilities :*
Table No. 7 reproduced hereunder shows the number of Medical Institutions of any kind per 100 sq. Km. in Kulu District.

The area figures utilized in the compilation of the Village Directory are derived as per the State Director of Land Records. These figures therefore represent the Tehsil/Sub-Tehsilwise, what is termed as the reporting area. The total area of Kulu District according to this source is only 462.10 Sq. Kms. as against the figure of 5,435 Sq. Kms. (Provisional) which is according to the Surveyor General, India as on 1st July, 1971. The difference in the two sets of figures is of the order of 4,972.90 Sq. Kms. which is very striking. In fact the figures according to the Surveyor General, India, is roughly eleven times higher than the one according to the State Director of Land Records. The interpretations based on the computations made in the above table are, therefore bound to be misleading. Using the area figures according to the Surveyor General, India, the number of Medical Institutions of any kind per 100 Sq.

Km. in Kulu District works out at 0.7, against 8 per 100 Sq. Km. in case the figure according to the State Director of Land Records is utilized. However, the number of Medical Institutions of any kind is the highest in Ani Sub-Tehsil which is 10 and the lowest in Nirmand Sub-Tehsil which is 4 (again based on the area figures according to State Director of Land Records). The table however, is capable of depicting a comparative picture of the Tehsil/Sub-Tehsils in matter of availability of Medical facilities. It may be noted that Tehsil/Sub-Tehsilwise breakup of area figures according to Surveyor General, India, is not available.

(d) *Electric Power Supply:*—Table No. 8 given hereunder is meant to throw light on the level of development of the district in terms of number of villages electrified, classified according to their distances from the nearest town.

Perusal of the above table would reveal that out of the 169 census villages in the District of Kulu only 36 can boast of having been connected with electric power supply. There are 42 villages in this district which are located at a distance varying between 51 and 100 Kms. from the nearest town. But out of these only 1 village has been electrified. The proportion of villages having electric power supply is higher in the class of villages which are situated at comparatively smaller distances from

the nearest town so much so that more than one third of the villages lying at 5 Kms. or less from the nearest town are electrified. The actual figures in this case are 6 out of 15.

(e) *Communications*.—Table No. 9 given hereunder displays the level of development of the communication systems in the villages of Kulu District, according to their distances from the nearest town.

The only means of communication in this district are Pucca and Kutcha Road. Of the 169 villages only 28 are connected by Pucca Roads and another 92 are connected by Kutcha Roads. Thus, 49 villages remain difficult of access due to absence of any developed means of communication. Out of the 42 villages situated between 51-100 Kms. from the nearest town none is connected by Pucca Road

Similarly, all but one of the 27 villages lying at 26-50 Kms. from the nearest town have no facility of a Pucca Road connection. But out of the 15 villages lying at 5 Kms. or less from the nearest town 5 have this facility.

(f) *Postal Facilities*:—Table No. 10 shows the number of Post Offices per 100 Sq. Km. in the Tehsil/Sub-Tehsils of Kulu District.

As in case of Table No. 7, the area figures utilized in this table are also according to State Director of Land Records, which have a marked difference as compared to the figure of Kulu District according to the Surveyor General, India. Any conclusion drawn on the basis of this table are therefore, bound to be rather misleading. Using the area figures according to the Surveyor General, India, the number of Post Offices per 100 Sq. Km. works out at only 1.42 (The absolute number of Post Offices in the district is 77). However, if the area figures according to the Director of Land Records are used, as is the case in the above table, the number of Post Offices per 100 Sq. Km. works out at 17 in this district. Further, the highest number of Post Offices per 100 Sq. Km. is in Ani Sub-Tehsil i.e. 22, whereas it is only 10, which is the lowest in case of Nirmand Sub-Tehsil. A fair comparative picture of Tehsil/Sub-Tehsils thus emerges from the table.

(g) *Staple Food*: Staple food of the inhabitants of Kulu District is comprised of wheat, maize and barley. The food is further subsidized with rice by the people who grow paddy or those who can afford.

(h) *Land use Pattern*: The Land use data has been collected and compiled under the following heads:

- (i) Forests
- (ii) Culturable Waste
- (iii) Area not available for cultivation.

The figures of (i) Irrigated area and (ii) Unirrigated area have also been compiled.

Statistics pertaining to cultivable area and cultivable waste in the villages according to their distances from the nearest town are displayed in the Table No. 11, which is reproduced hereunder.

The percentage of average cultivable waste per village to average cultivable land per village is 12.48 hectares. There is not much variation from one category of villages to another. However, it may be recorded that the

percentage is comparatively low i.e. 9.21 hectares in case of villages whose distance from the nearest town is between 16-25 Kms. Similarly the average cultivable waste per village in Kulu District is only 26.96 hectares.

Primary Census Abstract contains the identification particulars of the villages/enumerator's blocks and the respective area figures of each unit. The area figures in case of census villages are based on the revenue village papers as maintained in the respective Tehsil/Sub-Tehsil offices, and were collected alongwith the non-census data pertaining to the Village Directory. The latest available figures were taken into account. The totals of these area figures of the Tehsil/Sub-Tehsils do not tally with the Tehsil/Sub-Tehsil-wise and District-wise figures, because the former represent land use area, and do not necessarily include what is called as the "non-reporting area." Further the figures given in case of district represent the geographical area figures supplied by the Surveyor General, India. The Tehsilwise total area figures have been supplied by the Director of Land Records, Himachal Pradesh, whereas the area figures for towns have been furnished by the respective Local Bodies. In case of Districts and Tehsils/Sub-Tehsils, area figures for rural areas are derived by subtracting the urban area from the total area.

3. Occupied Census Houses and Households :

The next item of information pertains to the number of Occupied Residential Houses and the number of Households in a village/enumerator's block. It may be relevant to give here the

definitions of the terms 'House' and 'Household' as adopted in Census.

(i) *Census House*:—A Census House is a building or a part of a building inhabited or vacant and having a separate main entrance from the road or common courtyard or stair-case etc., used or recognised as a separate unit. It may be used for residential or non-residential purpose or both. If a building has a number of flats or blocks which are independent of one another having separate entrances of their own from the road or a common stair-case or a common courtyard leading to a main gate, they are considered as separate Census Houses. If within a large enclosed area there are separate buildings, then each such building is also considered as a separate House. If all the structures within an enclosed compound are together treated as one building then each structure with a separate entrance is treated as separate Census House.

(ii) *Census Household*:—A Household is a group of persons who commonly live together and would take their meals from a common kitchen unless exigencies of work prevented any of them from doing so. A household may be made up of related or unrelated persons.

4. Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes :

Primary Census Abstract is, again, perhaps the only source of information on Scheduled Caste and Scheduled Tribe components of the villagewise/blockwise population. The Castes and Tribes listed as Scheduled Castes/Tribes in Himachal Pradesh under the Government of India, Ministry of Home Affairs, Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes list Modification Order, 1956, constitute the Scheduled population in Census. It may be of interest to note here that, in fact, two different lists were utilised in the different areas

of Himachal Pradesh. Such a course was necessitated in view of the merger of certain areas from the erstwhile state of Punjab in Himachal Pradesh on 1. 11. 1966 when the three states of Punjab, Haryana and Himachal Pradesh were reorganised. The lists pertaining to Punjab were utilized in the newly merged areas whereas the lists pertaining to Himachal Pradesh were utilized in the old areas of the State. These lists are given hereunder:

Note:—There are no Scheduled Tribes in Kangra District, Kulu District, Simla District and Towns of Dalhousie (M. C.), Dalhousie (C. B.) and Bakloh (C. B.) of Chamba District.

5. Literate and Educated persons :

A person who can both read and write with understanding in any language is considered as literate. A person who can merely read but can not write is not taken as literate. It is not, however, necessary that a person who is literate should have had received any formal education or should have had passed any minimum educational standard.

6. Workers and Non-Workers :

In 1971 Census a person whose main activity is participation in any economically productive work by his physical or mental activity is treated as a worker. Main activity is the one in which one engages oneself mostly. Work involves not only actual work but effective supervision and direction of work. The reference period is one week prior to the date of enumeration in the case of regular work in trade, profession, service or business. If a person has participated in any such regular work on any one of the days during this reference period and that work is returned as his main activity the person is categorised accordingly. Further, the main activity in case of seasonal work such

as Cultivation, Livestock keeping etc., is ascertained with reference to such work in the preceding one year. Total population having been divided into the two groups of "Workers" and "Non-workers", the workers have further been classified by nine broad categories according to their main activities. The nine categories are briefly described hereunder:

I. Cultivator:—For the purposes of Census a person is considered as a Cultivator if he or she is engaged in Cultivation by his or herself or by supervision or direction in his or her capacity as the owner or lessee of land held from Government or as a tenant of land held from private persons or institutions for payment of money, kind or share. Cultivation involves ploughing, sowing, and harvesting and production of cereals and millet crops such as Wheat, Paddy, Jowar, Bajra, Ragi, etc., and Pulses, Raw Jute and Kindred fibre Crop, Cotton etc., and other crops such as Sugar-cane, Ground-nuts, Tapioca etc., and does not include Fruit Growing, Vegetable Growing or keeping Orchards or Groves or working of Plantations like Tea, Coffee, Rubber, Cinchona and other medicinal plants.

II. Agricultural Labourer:—A person who works in another person's land for wages in money, kind or share is regarded as an Agricultural Labourer. Such a person has no risk in the cultivation but he merely works in another person's land for wages. The labourer can have no right of lease or contract on land on which he works.

III. Livestock, Forestry, Fishing, Hunting and Plantations, Orchards and Allied Activities:—Those engaged in Livestock production, Agricultural services, Hunting, Trapping and game propagation, Forestry and Logging, Fishing, Plantations, Orchards etc., are included in this category.

IV. Mining and Quarrying:—This category includes all those who are working in only Mining or Quarrying activities.

V. Manufacturing, Processing, Servicing and Repairs:—This category has two sub-categories as below :

(a) *Household Industry:*—A Household Industry is defined as an industry conducted by the head of the household himself/herself/ and or mainly by the members of the household at home or within the village in rural areas and only within the premises of the house where the household lives in urban areas. The industry should not be run on the scale of a registered factory. Further, according to the census concept a Household Industry relates to production, processing, servicing, repairing or making and selling of goods.

(b) *Other than Household Industry:*—This sub-category includes Manufacturing, Processing, Servicing, and Repairs, other than Household Industry as described above.

VI. Construction:—Those engaged in any type of construction and allied activities are included in this category.

VII. Trade and Commerce:—This category includes all those persons who are engaged in wholesale or retail trade in any goods. Those working in Restaurants and Hotels, Banking, Financing, Insurance, Real Estate and Business services are also classified under this category.

VIII. Transport, Storage and Communications:—This category includes Land, Water and Air Transport. All activities connected with storage and ware housing and communications like Postal, Telegraph and Telephone etc., are also included in this category.

IX. Other Services:—Those engaged in Community, Social and Personal Services, including Public Administration, Medical and Health Services, Recreational and Cultural Services, Community Services are included in this category. Persons who happen not to adequately describe their activities or those whose services

are not classified elsewhere also form part of this category of workers.

*X. Non-workers:—*This group consists of those persons whose main activity is returned as one of the following :

(i) Household Duties.

(ii) Students.

(iii) Retired persons or rentiers.

(iv) Dependents.

(v) Beggars etc.

(vi) Institutions-inmates of

(vii) Other Non-workers (those seeking work.)

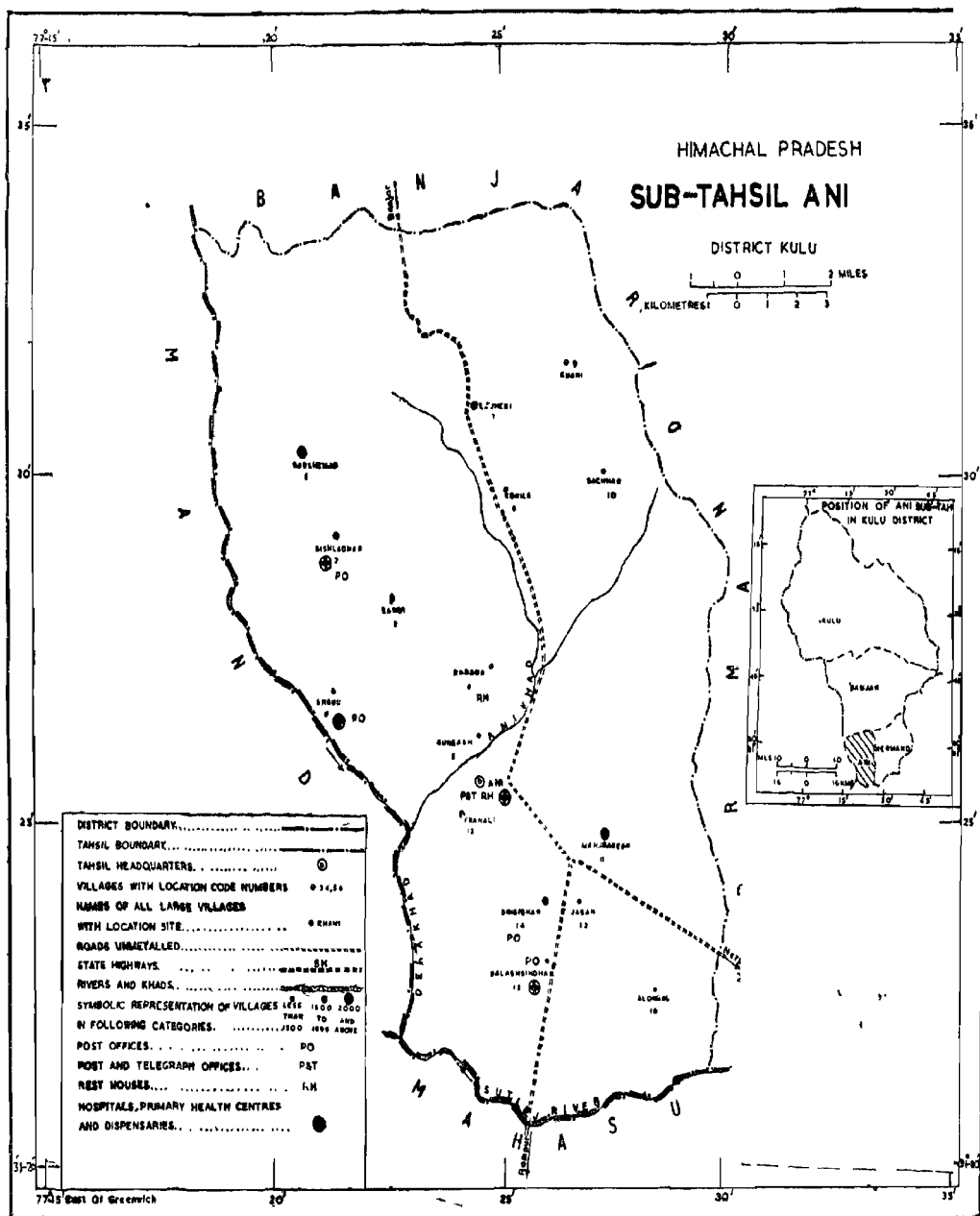

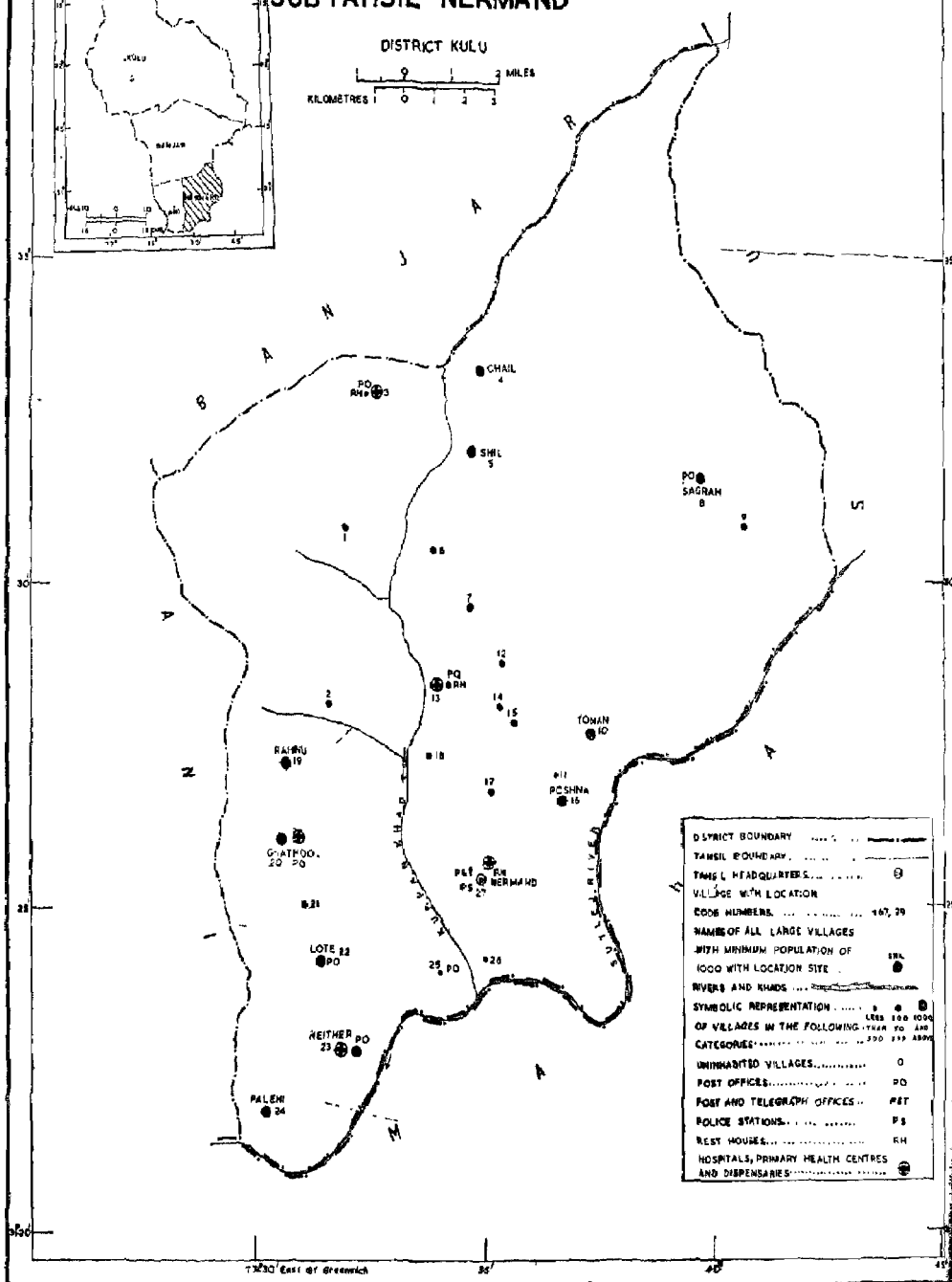
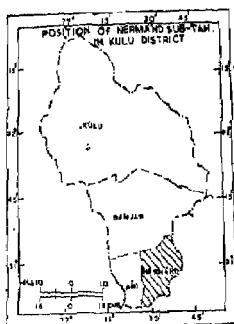
